

Strategies for building phonological awareness




Phonological awareness is a critical early literacy skill that helps kids recognize and work with the sounds of spoken language.

Phonological awareness is made up of a group of skills. Examples include being able to:

- Identify words that **rhyme**
- Recognizing **alliteration**
- **Segmenting** a sentence into **words**
- Counting the number of **syllables** in a name or word

The most sophisticated — and last to develop — is called phonemic awareness.




Phonemic awareness is the ability to notice, think about, and work with the individual sounds (phonemes) in spoken words.

- Recognizing which words in a set of words begin with the same sound (“Bell, bike, and boy all have /b/ at the beginning.”)
- Isolating and saying the first or last sound in a word (“The beginning sound of dog is /d/.” “The ending sound of sit is /t/.”)
- Combining, or blending the separate sounds in a word to say the word (“/m/, /a/, /p/ – map.”)
- Breaking, or segmenting a word into its separate sounds (“up – /u/, /p/.”)

The 4 levels of phonological awareness

Word Level	Syllable Level	Onset and Rime Level	Phonemic Awareness Level
Rhyming		Onset is the initial consonant, consonant blend, or consonant digraph, in a syllable or word. Not all words have onsets (at, in, oat).	The ability to identify and manipulate the individual sounds (phonemes) in a spoken word. For example, the word moon has three phonemes: /m/ /oo/ /n/
Alliteration	one-syllable words		
Sentence segmentation (counting words in a sentence)	multisyllable words	The rime is the first vowel sound and any other letters that follow it in a syllable. For example, in the word mat, the onset is /m/ and the rime is /at/.	Phonemic awareness is the most advanced skill of phonological awareness.



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5 Tips for Developing Phonological Awareness

Tip # 1: Play "I Hear" (I Spy)

- Find objects with matching beginning sounds. Hold an object in your hand, like a cup. Say, "I hear with my little ear something that begins with /k/. What else makes this /k/ sound?" (car, coat, cabinet, clock, cake, candy)

Tip # 3: Play with sounds in words


- [Fiddle with the First](#) - swap out the first sound of a word to make a new word
- [Fiddle with the Middle](#) - swap out the middle sound of a word to make a new word
- Tongue Ticklers & Twisters - alliterative phrases with an initial sound repeated over and over again
- Rhyme Swap - swap a word in a common nursery rhyme with a new word to make a new rhyming pattern

Tip # 4: Routinely play segmenting and blending games

- Turtle Talk & Cheetah Chat - slowing down and stretching out words (like a turtle) & speeding them up (like a cheetah)

Tip #5: Share scientific terms in engaging ways

- My Brain - "My brain is plastic, so fantastic, just like elastic, changes can be drastic! The more I learn, the more my brain changes... and rearranges!" by Carolyn H Strom, Ph.D



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Strategies for building phonological awareness

A quick note about phonological and phonemic awareness and phonics: *different but interrelated skills*

Phonological and **phonemic awareness** refer to **spoken language**

- The understanding that the sounds of spoken language work together to make words.

Phonics refers to the connection between **sounds and print**

- The instruction that teaches that letters represent the sounds of spoken language, or the alphabetic principle. Phonics is the tool teachers use to facilitate making print-sound associations.
